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hospitals and other healthcare providers. It is much the same way a fleet operator purchasing 25 delivery trucks would pay far less than a small business purchasing a single truck or two. While private insurance carriers negotiate discounts for the care their subscribers need, government sponsored insurers, such as Medicare and Medicaid, on the other hand, set their own reimbursement rates for patient care. These payment rates are usually fixed with no regard to the price a hospital or provider sets. We recognize all this can be complicated, but at KershawHealth, we are blessed with talented people who can help you understand what all this means to you when you need care. And now that we are participating in PricePoint, you will have another tool to help better understand where you might be able to get the best value for your healthcare dollars.
